 1.1 Briefly describe purpose of the service/policy e.g. How the service/policy is delivered and by whom If responsibility for its implementation is shared with other departments or organisations Intended outcomes 	Somer Valley Rediscovered is a Greenspace Project located in Radstock, Midsomer Norton and Westfield and aims to improve biodiversity on 5 key sites, Staddlestones Park being one of those sites. It also aims to improve the physical accessibility of these sites for visitors and to increase the amount of community engagement. The project has funding from West of England Combined Authority (WECA) and match funding from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) S106, and project partners. Implementation is the responsibility of Somer Valley Rediscovered (SVR) / B&NES Council + Town & Parish Councils who own the sites. Staddlestones Park is a B&NES owned site. The purpose of this consultation is for <u>Somer Valley Rediscovered</u> to engage early with local residents and users of the park to encourage good conversations and build strong relationships, to plan the improvements to the park in order to increase biodiversity and create a welcoming space for residents to use for physical and mental wellbeing.

2.1 What equalities training have staff received to enable them to understand the needs of our diverse community?	All four members of the Somer Valley Rediscovered team have received Equalities Training from the B&NES Corporate Equality Officer 2023
2.2 What is the equalities profile of service users?	The Somer Valley is an area of high health need, in sharp contrast to other areas of B&NES. There are higher levels of childhood obesity, people living in poverty, higher levels of physical inactivity, and poor adult mental health (higher than national and local figures). Other non- communicable diseases such as hypertension, diabetes, asthma, and coronary heart disease are also higher in this area of B&NES. (Public Health Team, B&NES) <u>Strategic Evidence Base</u>
2.3 Are there any recent customer satisfaction surveys to refer to? What were the results? Are there any gaps? Or differences in experience/outcomes?	As the project has only just moved into the delivery phase there are currently no Customer Satisfaction Surveys available but they will form part of the monitoring and evaluation of the project.

2.4 What engagement or consultation has been undertaken as part of this EIA and with whom? What were the results?	A B&NES Voicebox survey carried out in 2017 revealed that residents of the Somer Valley value the natural environment less than other areas of B&NES. This suggests a level of disconnect from nature.
2.5 If you are planning to undertake any consultation in the future regarding this service or policy, how will you include equalities considerations within this?	A consultation event will take place on Saturday 10 th June in Staddlestones Park. Residents will be able to take part in free nature-based activities provided by Somer Valley Rediscovered and discuss improvements to the park with the Project Managers and Landscape Architect. There will be some display boards showing some suggestions for improvements and there will be chance to complete an online survey. This will also be available the weekend prior at community events in Midsomer Norton and Radstock on the 3 rd & 4 th June. All three nature-based activities are inclusive sessions, delivered by Sing-a-ling and EcoWild, who have experience of working with children and adults with additional needs. The sessions include one for families with toddlers, one for adults and older residents and one for families with children of all ages.
	The changes to the park are intended to improve access to greenspace. Pre-visit information will be available on our website which will be launched in June to help people plan their visit. The website will meet WCAG 2.1 AA accessibility standards.

3.1 Issues relating to all groups and protected characteristics	The consultation event will be open to everyone and having a survey available will also allow us to reach those who are unable to attend. A variety of communication methods have been provided, including a telephone number and email address and in-person options. An initial Green Social Prescribing (GSP) project run by Natural England in the Somer Valley identified lack of opportunities for men with poor mental health to access GSP activities which did exist. Part of the improvements to the park include delivering regular GSP opportunities and working with GPs and healthcare professionals to signpost patients to green activities.	Girls and young women can feel excluded from parks due to sports- oriented facilities or safety concerns. Ensure we get feedback from girls and women during the consultation process to ensure the Masterplan created provides gender neutral facilities and a safe welcoming space ensuring Staddlestones provides equality for both sexes Resource <u>Make Spaces for Girls</u>
3.3 Pregnancy and maternity	One of the free sessions at the consultation event includes a toddler music workshop. Parents can bring multiple children free of charge. It is suitable for a range of ages but aimed at pre-schoolers	This group may feel unable to visit due to the lack of facilities. A toilet will be provided on the day of the event. Long term - improvements to the park entrances and pathways will benefit this group, as well as additional seating and benches

Numbers are limited for each session and the activities are quiet gentle sessions (even the toddler workshop which is acoustic) that encourage connection to nature. A Mental Health First Aider will be onsite for the duration of the event.	Due to lack of information someone with a disability may be unsure as to whether the park is suitable for them to visit and therefore attend the consultation event Part of the planned improvements to the park include improving accessibility at the entrances and pathways. There are currently large kissing gates designed to be wheelchair friendly but need improvements to accommodate motorised disability scooters Work with Project Partner 3SG (third sector group) to help reach this group. 3SG is a membership network of over 200 charities, social enterprises and community groups in Bath and North East Somerset (BaNES).

3.6 Age – identify the impact/potential impact of the policy on different age groups	Three different sessions are being provided during the consultation event including a toddler session, an adult session and a family session to provide something to attract all age ranges. The event has been advertised using a variety of communication methods including posters and social media. You can book a place on activities and provide feedback on park improvements online, via email or telephone.	There is a large portion of residents aged 45 – 59. They may feel the park is not a greenspace suitable for them so by providing a yoga and meditation class aimed at this age group during consultation event we hope to engage with them about the park improvements
